**Human dignity** recognizes the equal and inalienable value of every member of the human family. Dignity is recognized as a foundational value and as a legal right in international law from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948) to the Sustainable Development Goals (2015); it is found in most of the world's constitutions, and figures prominently in a growing body of jurisprudence worldwide. Dignity affects our sense of self-worth, how we engage with others, how we live, and who we imagine ourselves to be, and how we interact in our social and natural environments. It is implicated in all areas of experience and law and it is gaining recognition as an important legal claim throughout the world.

On **May 12, 2017**, the **Dignity Rights Project** at Delaware Law School in Wilmington, Delaware, will host a Workshop for **scholars** working on dignity rights and for **practitioners** advancing legal claims based on human dignity.
